## 20 Amazingly Beautiful English Idioms

1. **Every cloud has a silver lining** – every difficult situation has a comforting hopeful aspect or view the situation on positive note.

**Ex:** I was so upset when I didn't get the job as a Cashier at the café. But now, I have my dream job. **Every cloud has a silver lining.** 

2. **It takes two to tango** – both persons are equally responsible for the act.

Ex: We need to come into compromise here. It does take two to tango you know.

- 3. **A change of heart** a move to another opinion or attitude **Ex:** She had **a change of heart** when she realized that having a vacation is a very good idea after all.
- **4. Water under the bridge** events in the past and considered no longer important in the present.

Ex: We used to have long arguments and disagreements, but it's now water under the bridge. Let's all move on.

5. **To burn the midnight oil** – to study or work late through the night.

Ex: I've been burning the midnight oil trying to finish some important documents.

6. **Lovely weather for ducks** – humorous phrase for a rainy weather.



Ex: What do you think of the weather today? – Oh I believe it's going to be a lovely weather for ducks.

7. **To burn the candle at both ends** – to do something from the very early morning until late at night and ending up not enough rest or sleep.

Ex: Stop burning the candle at both ends. You are not getting enough sleep.

**8. To burn your bridges** – permanently ending relations to a person or an organization.

**Ex:** I'm so pleased that I didn't **burn the bridge** with my previous Boss because he now wants to hire me in his own company.

**9.** To wear your heart on your sleeves – openly share your feelings or emotions than keeping it inside.

Ex: I wear my heart on sleeves and I'm afraid I am going to tell if I do or don't like the person.

- 10. **To lend an ear** listen to somebody with great sympathy **Ex:** You know I'm always here to **lend an ear** when you need one.
  - **11. To touch someone's heart** to make someone feel a specific emotion or strong feelings

Ex: My boyfriend and I had an argument and he left the house. When he came back, he handed me a bouquet of red



roses with a note "I'm terribly sorry and I love you", he certainly **touched my heart.** 

**12. To have a soft spot for someone** – to have a great deal of affection or feeling to someone/something.

Ex: I always have a huge soft spot for Cherry blossoms.

**13. To take one's breath away** – you are emphasizing that it's extremely beautiful or amazing

**Ex:** The engagement ring literally **took my breath away**. There was a huge diamond on it.

**14. To spread one's wings** – to become completely independent, confident to try new things

Ex: Having my own job now gave me the chance to spread my wings.

**15.** Variety is the spice of life – new and exciting experiences make life more very interesting

Ex: I started learning how to speak in Japanese after I've learned French because variety is the spice of life.

**16. To only have eyes for someone-** to be attracted or interested in one person.

Ex: I only have my eyes on my girlfriend because she's the love of my life.

**17.** The calm before the storm – a quiet and peaceful period of time before an argument or large activity happens.



**Ex:** This is just **the calm before the storm**, when the kids get home from school this house will be in chaos.

**18. Those three little words** – indirectly referring to the words "I love you"

**Ex:** Has he said **those three little words** to you already?

**19. Hook, line and sinker -** used to emphasize that someone has been completely deceived or tricked.

Ex: You got me hook, line and sinker when you told me that you will be in American Idol.

**20.** What goes around comes around- if you treat someone badly or did something negative, it's very likely the same thing will come back to haunt you.

Ex: She always bullied me during high school and now her boss terrorized her. What goes around comes around.
