## ENGLISH IDIOMS TO SPEAK LIKE A NATIVE SPEAKER

**1. Action speaks louder than words -** actions are more important than words

Ex: You always speak of the importance of learning, but you never do anything. Actions speak louder than words!

2. To add fuel to the fire – to make the bad situation much worst

**Ex:** Please don't talk to me when I'm in a bad mood. It just adds fuel to the fire.

3. The ball is in your court- it's your chance to make the next decision/steps

Ex: I did everything to make it up to you and now, the ball is in your court.

**4. To bend over backwards** – do whatever it takes to achieve something or help someone

Ex: The school is bending over backwards just to please the students

5. **To bite off more than you can chew -** trying to do more than what you are able to do

**Ex:** When he accepted two part-time jobs, he is clearly biting off more than he can chew.

**6.** By the skin of one's teeth – manage to do something by the smallest margin or narrowly succeed in doing something.

**Ex:** I think he will pass the bar exam by the skin of his teeth.

**7.** To cry wolf - to keep asking for help, even when you don't need it, and when you really need help, no one believes in you.

**Ex:** The little boy had **cried wolf** so many times that when he was really sick no one believed him.



**8. To cut somebody some slack** – to give someone a break

**Ex:** You need to cut the trainees some slack, they are barely new and still learning.

9. To cut to the chase – to come to the point/ get direct to the point

**Ex:** I haven't got all day for this discussion. Let's cut to the chase.

10. **To get one's head around something** – to understand something

Ex: I'm going to try to get my head into this new law on immigration.

11. **To hear on the grapevine** – to hear an unconfirmed rumor or story.

Ex: I heard on the grapevine that the new receptionist is leaving us soon.

**12. It takes two to Tango** - certain actions or activities done by two people to participate.

**Ex:** I don't blame only the woman for the affair, it takes two to tango.

**13. To miss the boat** – to miss the opportunity or chance

Ex: I believe I missed the boat on that job, they have already hired someone for the position.

**14. A piece of cake** – an easy task

Ex: That surprised quiz was a piece of cake

**15. Pull yourself together -** to calm down and behave normally in an upsetting situation

Ex: I know that losing the one you love so dear can be devastating, but you need to pull yourself together and try to move on with your life.

16. To sit/be on the fence – to be neutral or not to take sides

Ex: I don't want to offend anyone here, so I'm sitting on the fence



**17. To step up one's game** – to start performing better

**Ex:** If you really want high grades, you need to step up your game.

**18.** To sell someone out – let someone's secret or information out

**Ex:** I put so much trust in you, and I can't believe you sold me out by leaking my secret to others just like that.

**19.** Your guess is as good as mine – I have no idea

**Ex:** Well, we don't have enough evidence here. Your guess is as good as mine.

20. Spur of the moment – impulsive decision done without a planEx: It was a spur of the moment decision.

**21. When it rains, it pours -** difficult situations tend to follow each other in succession or to arrive all at the same time.

**Ex:** No one in my family had been sick for many years, but everyone caught the flu last week at the same time. When it rains, it pours.

**22.** You can say that again – I totally agree, used to agree with another person.

**Ex: Regina:** This movie is so wonderful, do you think so?

Leslie: You can say that again!

**23. In a nut shell** – to be brief and straight to the point.

Ex: In a nutshell, all the new mayor was saying is that the fight against crime will be taken much more seriously.



24. **You know the drill** – when the task is always the same or you know what to do.

Ex: She knows the drill because she has worked there for many years.

**25. When pigs fly** – it means never!

**Ex:** He just keeps on making promises to me. This time I will never believe in him. When pigs fly!
